# **Building to the future**

he Hazel Andrews Building was officially opened on 2nd February, and it was a pleasure to finally come together as a school community to celebrate at the end of an eighteen month capital development project on a challenging site.

Hazel Andrews was a founding governor, who in 1978 had the dream of opening a school for boys amidst a change in the educational landscape nationwide. The current Prep School site was unused at the time and Hazel, with the support of a group of committed governors and parents, opened Yarm School the same year. From the humble beginnings of a school of 60 boys aged 11-18, the school now stands as a 3-18 establishment for 1100 boys and girls. For this rapid growth and continued excellence the school is rightly seen as one of the success stories of the independent sector. Without the foresight, courage and determination of Hazel, and many others along the way, the school would not be where it is today. It

therefore felt fitting that we should by Baroness Grey-Thompson honour Hazel's contribution by who shared with us some of honouring the new building after her.

The afternoon of the opening ceremony started with Hazel and Baroness Grey-Thompson, our guest speaker, cutting the ribbon with the School Captains, Dr Williams and Mr Sawyer. By this time the pupils from Years 3-6, staff and assembled guests (including founding Headmaster Neville Tate, Governors, former staff and many people involved in the build project) were assembled in the Hall for the start of the ceremony. We were welcomed by Dr Williams who reflected on Hazel's contributions to Yarm School and the founding principles which are still present across the school today.

Kaiden G (Year 5) then delighted everyone, bringing a few people to tears, with a truly stunning rendition of one of Chopin's Nocturnes which are generally considered among the finest short solo works for the piano. Following this spectacle, we were inspired

by Baroness Grey-Thompson who shared with us some of her life events and the importance of never giving up. She fielded a range of questions from the pupils and was both candid and amusing throughout. Proceedings then took a lively and creative turn as we were treated to a high octane dance from the Year 6 Drama Week and a fabulous performance by our Senior Choir of Chilcott's Red Boots On!

Mr Sawyer closed the event



# CHESS IMPRESS

From the very young Year 2 beginners all the way up to regional champions, our Yarm chess players continue to enjoy playing chess and 2023-24 was one of our most successful years, with events for all ages and abilities.

e continue to have two full days of chess every week over the course of the whole year as our core offering, featuring a very large range of activities from one-to-one lessons, lunchtime clubs to after-school sessions and regular tournaments.

One of the many highlights of the school year was the 28th Teesside Team Championship, one of the longest running chess tournaments in the world.

Yarm teams took the top places in both the Under-11 and Under-9 sections, although they had to work hard to overcome the challenges from other schools. In fact, they had to work harder than usual this year, as we had 26 teams in action from all across Teesside this time – easily the most we have seen post-COVID.

The attendance for all of our events – both internal and external - increased this year and we were grateful for the extra space afforded by the magnificent new school hall. The first chess event to enjoy the benefits of the new

building was the internal round of the Delancey UK Schools' Chess Challenge and the children enjoyed playing in the plush surroundings.

Our annual expedition to the HMC Chess Championships, at QEGS in Wakefield, gave our players the opportunity to test their strength against the best teams from all over the North of England. Our best performance on the day was produced by our Under-9 team, who finished in second place.

The Yarm Preparatory School House Chess Championship always brings out the competitive edge in our children. This time, Brunel outplayed the other three Houses to claim their first title since 2015.

The 7th Teesside UK Schools' Chess Challenge 'Megafinal', held once again at the prestigious Princess Alexandra Auditorium, was another great highlight of our busy year.

This exciting event brought together 150 eager competitors from all over the country and the standard of play in all of the sections was undoubtedly higher than ever. Such is the popularity of our annual Megafinal that we ran out of places several weeks before the closing date for entries.

The final term of the school year is always the busiest. We hosted the Teesside Individual Chess Championships, had the big Yarm School KO Tournament and several of our players went on to compete in the Delancey UK Schools' Chess Challenge 'Gigafinal' in Manchester.

Chess even makes appearances at our school Open Mornings, giving prospective new pupils an opportunity to see our lessons in action – and, of course, the chance to play against some of our star players.

The new school year promises to be even more action-packed than ever before and we are looking forward to another magnificent year of chess.

he art room is always such a bustling, creative environment, however, this year has been exceptional! It is a pleasure to see the joy on the children's faces when they realise what they have achieved, and the relaxation and comfort art can provide when the children are attending clubs and activities and completing their very own masterpieces.

This year, we celebrated Christmas Films by dressing shop windows with iconic scenes and characters from Home Alone, A Christmas Carol, Arthur Christmas, The Polar Express, The Snowman and Elf. From ceramic door knockers to pencil sketches of Kevin, this exhibition was a wonderful opportunity for us to share the children's superb work with the community.

Throughout the year, the children have thoroughly enjoyed enhancing their artistic skills whilst also strengthening

their scientific, historical and geographical knowledge, as well as transferring their mathematical skills to art lessons. We also debate issues, discuss the use of art for pupil well-being and explore careers in art.

Year 6 have been looking at Picasso's Guernica mural and taking inspiration from his incredible work. Using a wide variety of mediums, the children expressed their concerns regarding issues of their own choice through the cubist abstract style.

Year 5 crafted a variety
of masterpieces! They have
created batik images inspired
by Indonesian culture as well as
traditional Indonesian Wayang
Puppets which were used in music
lessons when exploring Gamelan
music. Street art has been a very
popular topic this year too.

Year 4 carefully crafted Egyptian canopic jars using the coil method. The children thought carefully about which organ would be stored in the jar, and therefore, which design to use!

Sculpture was also practised when the Year 4 children built a stunning Himalayan village based on the inferences they have drawn from their class reader Asha & The Spirit Bird. The children loved working with freedom in an imaginative and individual manner to interpret the story in their own creative way.

Year 3 children enjoyed our Prehistoric project which allowed them to visualise the very beginning of art, across the continents and to recreate the drawings discovered in magnificent caves such as Lasaux in France.

Studying Botanical Art has led to the Year 3 children dissecting flowers and recording from observation. They also studied the remarkable Marianne North, taking inspiration from her beautiful artworks.

The Paris Olympics was a perfect springboard for some original art! Year 6 explored how movement can be portrayed in drawings and paintings and focused on sketches of the human body. This then led to exploration of the Pop Art movement as well as superb ceramic sculptures of athletes. Year 5 redesigned the medals after taking inspiration from the Paris medals for the games this summer. Activities sessions worked on a collaborative piece which was a celebration of the Olympic sports.

We were delighted to meet Rebecca Norris from The Great Pottery Throwdown when she came to visit us in May. Local schools joined in and we created ceramic masterpieces inspired by Picasso.



t the Prep School, computing aims to foster digital literacy and technical skills in our pupils. Through a range of engaging and ageappropriate activities, children from Year 1 to Year 6 explore various aspects of computing, from programming and digital citizenship to online safety and historical perspectives on technology.

In Year 1, children have been using art tools to create their own versions of the Transporter Bridge. They are also learning to program routes using Beebots, navigating from one location to another.

Year 2 have been learning how to use Google Apps including Slides, where they have made their own slideshow. They have also had the opportunity to explore coding further using ScratchJr and Scratch.

Year 3 pupils began by setting up their computing portfolios. These portfolios will store work completed from Years 3 through 6, serving as a platform to celebrate and reflect on their accomplishments. The Year 3 curriculum also focuses on becoming proficient with various Google Apps, including learning about emailing and email etiquette.

Digital Citizenship and toy designing using Scratch. Pupils were given a brief to create a toy, guiding them from concept to the final product. Throughout the process, they considered the toy's input, algorithm, and output.


In Year 5, pupils delved into the history of encryption, exploring how and why Emperor Caesar used ciphers to send secret messages. They also advanced their coding skills on Scratch, designing games aimed at Year 2 or 3 pupils that incorporate school values. For instance, James created a game where players must safely cross a road and answer safety-related questions.

Year 6 explored the history of computing and the pioneers behind modern technology. During the Spring Term, they focused on online safety, digital habits, and the dangers of plagiarism. In the Summer Term, they learned coding and HTML to create their own web pages.


Our Digital Leaders had a busy year, helping to run some important partnership events. Chief among these was the Internet Safety Workshop in February, where they welcomed Digital Leaders from eight local primary schools, along with representatives from companies such as Google and C-Learning, to talk specifically about the findings from our annual Internet Safety Survey. They have also been visiting local primary schools across Teesside, delivering virtual reality sessions to a total of 900 children over the course of the year.

The children arrived at the first session full of excitement and were ready to get started. The focus and determination to acquire tricky skills was phenomenal. 
