OUR MOST SUCCESSFUL EVER BEBRAS CHALLENGE

Earlier this term, 224 Yarm School pupils from First Year to Upper Sixth joined over 460,000 young people from across the UK, to take part in the 2024 UK Bebras Challenge.

This is a timed challenge designed to introduce students to strategies used in problem-solving and software development. Examples of these techniques would include the ability to break down complex tasks into simpler components, algorithm design, pattern recognition, pattern generalisation and abstraction.

Of the 224 Yarm pupils, 60 were in the top 10% nationally and will be invited to take part in the prestigious Bebras Coding Challenge taking place during the Spring Term.

STAYING AHEAD IN BUSINESS!




Whilst the rest of the school is focused on being festive, the EconBus Department are ahead of the game, and planning for Easter!!

MEDICAL PROFESSIONS TASTER DAY AT THE JAMES COOK UNIVERSITY

At the weekend around twenty members of the current Fourth Year chose to participate in a medical professions workshop for those curious about careers in the health sector.

The morning was organised around a series of stations in the STRIVE centre at James Cook (South Tees Research, Innovation and Education). The centre is the location for much of the region's teaching and training, as well as cutting edge healthcare research. This connection ensured that the pupils were welcomed, prepared and led by some of the best well as providing concrete insight

educators in the health sector. Moving around in small groups the pupils experienced the use of robotics for surgical procedures, the dextrous skills required for vascular surgical work, and A&E/critical care station, an area set up to simulate the work of obstetrics and gynaecology, as well as clever tech that replicates the experience of drawing blood from a patient.

It is very much hoped that the experience will have assisted the pupils in exploring their current interests in the health professions, as into some of the skills and attributes needed for success.

An excellent all round performance by the students involved! Well done.





I used a black cobblestone glaze and I did it in the ceramics club with Dr Harker and when you add the glaze you put it in the kiln which makes it have that crackle effect.



Welcome to Our Termly Eco-Schools Update!

Join us as we dive into the latest from the Eco Representatives Club! In each article, we'll explore the exciting eco-initiatives our schools have taken on this term, discuss pressing environmental issues, and share plenty more on how we're working together to make a difference. Stay tuned for inspiring stories, new projects, and ways you can get involved!

Yarm School joined the Eco-Schools programme in 2008 and is one of a few schools in the North East of England to have achieved the Green Flag Award seven consecutive times.

November campaign

Cut your carbon - this campaign took place during November, it encouraged young people and their families to complete six simple actions to raise awareness and reduce their carbon footprint. Actions raise awareness, change behaviours and help reduce your emissions. The steps included walking to school instead of taking the bus or car to reduce our carbon footprint, reducing shower times and buying fewer new items

Why should we cut our carbon? Every day we generate energy, drive cars, grow food, and power factories. These activities can release huge amounts of greenhouse gases into the atmosphere.

More greenhouse gases means more trapped heat. This is making Earth warmer, creating 'climate change'. Climate change is harming our planet, melting ice caps and creating dangerous weather events including drought, and floods.

The steps included; make 5 miles of travel active, go plant based for a day, turn the heating down by 1 degrees per week, buy nothing new for 1 month, substitute 4 baths for 4 showers and limit them to 4 minutes and switch off all electronic devices for an hour. How many of these did you complete in November? Eco schools beach clean up This term, the Eco School Reps travelled to Marske Beach with the Year 2 Prep School pupils for a beach clean up. Beach clean ups like this play an essential role in protecting the environment by removing harmful waste, especially plastics, which can damage marine life and pollute our oceans. Every piece of litter collected helps to reduce pollution, protect wildlife habitats, and keep our beaches clean and beautiful for everyone to enjoy. This hands-on experience also encourages young pupils to become mindful of their impact on the environment and inspires them to make positive changes in their everyday lives. The Senior School Eco-reps enjoyed sharing this experience with the younger pupils.

Eco in the Financial Times

High Pacific surface temperatures fuel record warm year.

Unusually hot seas lead to more rain, causing flooding in many parts of the world.

Sea surface temperatures remained unusually high across many regions in the Pacific Ocean in November, leaving the world on course for a record warm year, the European Earth observation agency said: the month of November was the second-warmest on record on land and at sea, with air temperatures at 1.62C above pre-industrial levels.

data from Copernicus showed the average sea surface temperature for the month was 20.58C. This produced more rainfall than normal in many parts of the world last month, causing flooding, as the warmer air holds more moisture.

'BREAKING THE SILENCE': POLITICS STUDENTS IN LIVE LINK WITH TEL AVIV

This week the Politics students came together for a combined class for a remote talk with **Breaking The** Silence from Tel Aviv, Israel. The Department first became more fully aware of the work of this Israel-based where he was an enthusiastic NGO during a previous study trip to Israel-Palestine in 2015. Founded in 2004 the organisation consisted of veteran soldiers from the Israeli Defence Force who have opted to speak out and share their testimony of experiences they underwent during their time in the military. From as he was repeatedly expected to the link above you will be able to explore the breadth and depth of these written and video witness statements.

On Tuesday we connected with Luiz Aberbui, a former soldier and now the the responses of Jewish settlers in **Jewish Diaspora Educational** Coordinator of BtS. Luiz's journey began in his home country of Brazil advocate for Jewish youth organisations, choosing a number of vears later to move to Israel. As with all citizens this entailed undertaking a excused on the grounds of military period of military service, typically ranging from 24 to 32 months. The experience profoundly impacted Luiz follow orders that he found counter-productive, problematic, or at odds with his values. Some of this was the result of engagement with

the Palestinian population, but also the region. Luiz shared a number of accounts of his own, as well as those of fellow soldiers. A theme that emerged most strongly was the problems arising from the militarisation of a society, whereby so many decisions could be justified or need. Luiz shared this short documentary that featured in the New York Times, providing further explanation and insight into the challenges and problems resulting from the arrangements in place in Israel-Palestine.



Enaiatollah is an inspiring character who deals with fear and horror all over inequality in the Middle East. his journey. The degree of violence and


pain he has seen would leave many scarred and unable to function. However, he kept pushing himself to

rights, all seen through the eyes of 10 vear old Malala.




and Flo - who help him transform through his time in the Eerie.





What Parents & Carers Need to Know about SETTING UP APPS, GAMES AND SOFTWARE

Millions of new phones, tablets, laptops and games consoles will be nestling under Christmas trees this year. However, even if parents and carers have gone to the trouble of setting up these new devices and enabling the safety features, there are still potential hazards in the apps, games and software that children will want to install and use. Knowing what to look for and discussing those risks with your child may help avoid any nasty surprises this Christmas. Here are our top tips for ensuring that unwrapping this year's presents doesn't unleash any unexpected dangers.

TAKE NOTE OF AGE RATINGS

Back when most games were bought in shops, checking the age rating was easy: it was on the front of the box. Now that most games are ating was easy: it was on the front of he box. Now that most games are iownloaded, it's tougher – but not mpossible. All reputable download stores show a game's age rating at the point of purchase, and you can check the suitability of a specific title your child wants to play at rideostandards.org.uk/RatingBoard/games

FREE' ISN'T ALWAYS FREE

The games market has changed radically in recent years. Many titles are free to download, but then tempt players to pay for cosmetic items (as in Fortnite) or to unlock additional content. There can be huge peer pressure for children to pay for these items. Agree a budget for in-game purchases before the game is downloaded, and make sure children can't authorise in-game purchases by themselves.

DISABLE IN-APP PURCHASING

It's not wise to leave children with devices that can make in-app purchases without your permission. Ideally, set up computers, consoles and phones so child accounts need an adult's authorisation to buy anything. On shared devices (ilke iPads, which don't allow user accounts), check the settings to ensure that in-app purchasing requires the account nolder's password, fingerprint or face ID.

APPS ARE AGE RATED, TOO

18 Like games, apps in the major stores have age ratings, too – so you can see in advance whether an app's appropriate for your child. Additionally, phones' parental control settings allow you to set age limits, preventing young ones from downloading unsuitable apps themselves. These ratings aren't infallible, however: we've seer TV apps featuring adult shows with an age rating of 3, for example.

LEGAL APPS THAT BREAK THE LAW

There are many apps that are perfectly legal but enable illegal activity – streaming apps which let people watch football matches, say, without paying for Sky or BT Sport. Prosecution for using such apps is rare, but they can lead to risky behaviour like viewing rogue streams on sites teeming with maliclous links. Watch for children installing unusual apps with 'TV', 'stream' or 'sport' in the name.


CONSIDER STORAGE

Most apps and games will tell you in the online store how much space they need on a device. Check this carefully – especially with games, which can run into hundreds of megabytes and beyond. If you don't have enough free storage on a device to run the game or app, you won't get a refund from the store. You can normally check a device's available storage space through the settinger menu through the settings menu.

IN-APP REGISTRATION

It's common for apps and games to ask users to register: entering personal details like email address, date of birth and other information you might not want your child to divulge. Ask them to get your permission before giving any personal info to an app – and consider using your details rather than the child's, so they're not targeted by marketing spam or put at risk of having their data stolen. can scan your computer to see if it will run certain games properly. On consoles, make sure you're buying the right versior some newer Xbox or PlayStation games

MONITOR IN-GAME COMMS

Voice chat with friends is part of the fun of modern gaming – but danger lurks here too. Many titles have open chat systems, meaning that children could speak to strangers or hear adult language and verbal abuse when games get particularly competitive. Using a shared tamily area (as opposed to alone in bedrooms) for online gaming is a good way to keep an occasional ear on what's being said.

BE WÅRY OF GIFTS

Titles like Roblox, Minecraft and Fortnite have in-game currencies, which can be earned through progress in the game – but can also be bought with real money. A common scam is for a young player to be offered currency if they click a link, visit a certain site or contact another user directly. Warn your child about such offers; they should show you if they're in any doubt over an in-game gift.

WATCH OUT FOR IMITATORS

Even In the official stores, untrustworthy rogue apps can slip through the net. Common tricks are apps or games that have a slightly different name to the genuine article (Fortnight rather than Fortnite, for instance) or use logos which deliberately look very similar to the official app. To avoid downloading these imitations, read the app's description and check who the publisher is listed as.

STAY UPDATED

HELLO

Most games and apps are subject to regular updates, which not only offer new content and features but also provide critical security improvements. Children tend to ignore such updates – usually because they don't understand why they're important, or they simply want to get straight on with gaming. Check your child's devices periodically to make sure these updates are being installed.
