House Chess—Round Three

This year's House Chess Championship took a very dramatic turn in the third and final set of fixtures, which, after the smoke of battle had finally cleared, saw three teams sharing first place, with the title being decided only on 'wins scored' (think 'goals scored', for those in need of a football analogy!).

Arkwright, who looked to be out of the race for top honours after a defeat in the earlier rounds, crushed an under-strength and dispirited Telford side, who clearly felt there was little to play for after their poor start to the event.

Captain Henry Stanley, veteran Rory Fitzgerald and the very loyal Felicity Thompson all scored points for Telford, but, as a team, they were heavily outgunned. Captain Paari Muthukrishnan set the example, as always, and his win was matched by Jayden Wang, William Garratt, Bea Tailby, Zoyaa Soni and Kathryn Frost. Noah Speight was the top scorer in the match, with one win and one draw.

The final score was Arkwright 7.5, Telford 2.5.

Meanwhile, the match between Stephenson and Brunel was the most dramatic of all.

It was close for a very long time, but then Stephenson moved up a gear to power their way to a 13.5-7.5 victory.

Captain Fathe Chahal won two games for Brunel and his example was followed by Scarlett Yang, Monty Bowen, Austin Oman, Agam Vats and Harrison Vanek, all of whom picked important points.





However, Stephenson had victory on their minds. They also had Dara Jafari on their side; he won four games out of four. Ziad Salim, Max Hollingsworth, Freddie Bonner, Edward Williams and Sandy Omar all won important points too.

However, we can single out Stan Dugdale, who won two games, as the star of the show, because it was his captaincy which made all of the difference throughout the three tough rounds of the 2025 House Chess Championship and this is his best chess achievement to date.

The big victory meant that Stephenson became the champions on the aforementioned 'points scored' tiebreaker, narrowly ahead of 2024 champions Brunel and Arkwright respectively. Telford finished in fourth place.

Well played everyone and congratulations to Stephenson, who have now won the House Chess Championship seven times since the start of the event, back in 1994.



refers to falsified or misleading material presented as a legitimate account of 'Fake news events. It's often used by malicious actors online to push an agenda, or even by criminals as a way of making scams more persuasive. Scammers can trick us into handing over personal information, security details and even our hard-earned cash

"CLICKBAIT" PHISHING SCAMS

Have you seen this video of yourself? A message arrives saying "Have you seen this video of yoursel(?" or you might be sent an attention-grabbing headline about a celebrity that's been shared on social media. This kind of Had a been shared of social media, mis kind of "bait" is produced by scammers to drive us to click on an unsafe link, where malware could be downloaded to our devices. These scams rely on our curiosity and our "need-to-know" instinct.

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SALES, DEALS & DISCOUNTS

Some scams appear as adverts, offering a chance to buy something – such as designer products, expensive gadgets or tickets to a popular show – at a reduced price. Such ploys often include a time limit or countdown, urging us to hurry so we don't miss out on the deal. This preserve one encourages up to input to streamed. pressure encourages us to input personal details or payment information before pausing to check if it's legitimate.

GETCARD YOU'RE A WINNER!

This kind of scam involves fake giveaways, opportunities or freebies. It could be a message saying we've won a prize draw or competition. Or it could be a gift, free triat, bonus credit, and suchlike. It might claim that a package or refund is waiting. All these techniques are used to prompt us to share our personal information, thinking that there's something to be gained by doing so.

HAPPENS num

FALSE FRIENDSHIPS

Scammers often pretend to be someone they're not to gain their victims' trust. They might attempt to convince any children they connect with that they're a child of similar age with shared interests. Warning signs include a high volume of messages (often with an intense tone), secrecy, inappropriate levels of intimacy, guilt tripping, emotional manipulation, threats or blackmail.

PANIC MODE

To trigger a sense of panic, scammers may claim that a child's account has been hacked, or a virus has been installed on their device, or any a virus has been installed on their device, or an number of other scary scenarios. They may claim to be able to fix the problem or offer a solution – if the child hands over control of the device or sensitive information. Similar scams involve impersonating a friend or relative, claiming that they're in trouble and need help.

FAKE CELEBRITY **ENDORSEMENTS**



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Impersonating influential people online is a common tactic for scammers, who can use technology to create fake photos, audio and even videos that look authentic. These can be even videos that look authentic. These can be used to convince us, for example, to buy products, sign up for so-called "business opportunities" or invest in cryptocurrency schemes – all of which are fake or otherwise malicious. Many scams also involve the impersonation of popular companies' social media accounts, as well as those of individuals.

NEWS

Advice for Parents & Educators

STAY INFORMED

Stay up to date with the latest information and best practice on cyber-security. See what scam stories are reported in the news and make note of what tactics were used. Keep up with young people's digital lives: talk about what they're doing online and use properly endorsed resources to learn what risks certain sites and apps pose to their younger users.

ENCOURAGE HEALTHY SCEPTICISM

Most scams rely on emotional or psychological manipulation, tapping into our human institucts – whether that's to be over some lives safe, help others, find answers, make friends, avoid losing out or to secure something we really want. Encourage children to recognise that pressure to act and to always consult with an adult – especially if what's on offer sounds too good to be true.

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TALK TOGETHER

Chat often and openly with young people about fake news, online scams and how they both work. Encourage them to talk to you about anything they're unsure of or worried about online. If a child claims to have been scammed, don't pass judgement. Blaming the victim may deter young people from asking you for help. Remember: adults are scammed just as often, if not more.

BE PROACTIVE

Children increasingly use digital devices for education, socialising, shopping and play. Don't wait for a problem to arise before you discuss the risk of scarns, false information and fake news. Highlight what to look out for and clearly communicate under what circumstances the child ought to speak to an adult. Finally, ensure that they're aware of the support services that are available to them (such as Childline)
