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GEOGRAPHY FIELDWORK

On Thursday afternoon the Upper Sixth geographers embarked on a trip in the sun to Yarm town centre to investigate our local hazard-flood risk. We started off at the town hall looking at the 2m flood height from 1771 and then walked over to Flood Cottage where the height is also marked. We then walked down to the river to look at the flood gates and the current replacements and improvements occurring. We also spoke about soft engineering methods such as signs

and flood warnings on social media as well as the importance of the Canal and Rivers trust and Environment Agency on reducing flood risk. The walk concluded with a look at the river banks where willow spiling and coir (a coconut husk) has been placed on the banks to prevent erosion. Overall, the trip was insightful and enjoyable, providing important names and numbers for our upcoming A levels.

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THE SENIOR DEBATE TEAM'S ANNUAL DINNER



Last Friday, the Senior Debate Team gathered at the stately Crathorne Hall for their highly anticipated Annual Formal Dinner, With meticulous organisation by Eve, every societal responsibility? The discussion detail was in place - name cards carefully arranged, an air of elegance permeating the hall, and an atmosphere befitting an evening of high-calibre debate. Everyone arrived Dungeons & Dragons was once dressed to impress, setting the stage for an intellectually charged night.

The evening opened with a motion guaranteed to ignite discussion: This House supports censorship of the arts and literature. From the outset, students grappled with complex moral dilemmas. Should Mein Kampf be accessible on a public bookshelf? Could censorship prevent literature from being weaponised by despots or protect impressionable minds from harmful ideologies? Yet, counterarguments surfaced - wasn't literature a force for change, a means of ensuring history is neither erased nor rewritten in Orwellian fashion? The debate soon expanded beyond

literature, delving into the legitimacy of humour rooted in racism, homophobia, and xenophobia. Was this a matter of 'PC policing' or was fierce, punctuated by a particularly entertaining exchange between Mr Edwards and Mr Bridges, as Mr Edwards recounted how deemed too subversive for schools an ironic example of flawed censorship at the expense of Mr Bridges' beloved Tuesday activity session.

Following the main course, the motion turned to culture: This House believes Barbie is a feminist figure. The debate proved both impassioned and insightful. Students dissected Barbie's evolution beyond a plastic icon, questioning whether she was a genuine symbol of empowerment or merely a commercialised dream built for profit. The Barbie movie's parallels with Malorie Blackman's Noughts & Crosses were explored, highlighting how its matriarchal world served as a

mirror to systemic gender inequality rather than a utopia. Was Barbie an emblem of inspiration, or was she an unattainable ideal peddled under the guise of progress?

After dessert. Eleanor delivered a gracious speech reflecting on her tenure as President, acknowledging the dedication of her outreach team (Apsara, Ellie, and Gabe), her secretary, Eve, and the teachers who supported the society. Mr Bridges praised Eleanor's leadership, commending her ability to foster debate, increase engagement, and steer the team from the front with

passion and poise.

With anticipation high, the new committee was announced: Anya was elected Social Secretary, Zaara as Outreach Officer, and, in the closest presidential vote in history, Adam emerged victorious, with Rishi taking on the newly established role of Vice President. Their leadership promises an exciting year ahead, filled with rigorous, spirited debate.



After GCSEs at Yarm which included Business, Gemma opted for A Levels in Art, Textiles and Business and initially planned on going to Uni in London. Results day didn't quite go to plan, and Gemma found herself working at eighteen, but this made her more driven to succeed.

Determined to make the most of opportunities she refocused and achieved a 1st Class Marketing degree from Teesside University, before launching her career in Marketing and Events at the University itself. Her next adventure took her to London, where she joined Lawton Communications Group (LCG).

The annual House Chess tournament took place this term, with Oswald looking to retain their title and Cuthbert still hurting from losing their long unbeaten run.

The format of matches remains unchanged; a total of seven boards contested by players in each year group in a best-of-7 match. However, this year's competition adopted a "round-robin" format with each team playing every other team, meaning more matches and more chess than in previous years.

The first round of matches were contested in the first half of term, and saw Cuthbert and Oswald record convincing victories over Aidan and Bede, respectively, both by a scoreline of 5.5 boards to 1.5.

The second round of matches included a repeat of last year's final, between Oswald and Cuthbert, widely believed to be the two favourites to win this year's competition. Oswald proved too strong and ran out 4.5 - 2.5 winners, leaving them well placed to defend their title. Aidan recorded a close 4 - 3 victory over Bede to give themselves an outside chance of



becoming champions heading into the final round of fixtures.

Oswald headed into their final match knowing that any victory over Aidan would see their name engraved on the trophy. An impressive 5 - 2 victory confirmed Oswald as champions for the second year in a row. The final match of the competition was more important for Bede as they fought to avoid finishing last place for the second year running. Bede did manage to beat Cuthbert by 4 boards to 3, leaving Aidan, Bede and Cuthbert on equal points separated only by game difference.

NETBALL NATIONAL WINNERS!







At the beginning of the season, if someone had told us we would be standing on the highest podium at Nationals, we might have laughed. The odds were not in our favour. The team was fragmented, missing key players, and adjusting to a new dynamic. We were a squad of individuals rather than a collective force, searching for synergy on the court.

But over time, something changed. We trained with relentless intensity, sharpening our tactics and strengthening our bonds. Twice a week, we drilled our formations, refined our set plays, and battled against the U16 squad in training matches that tested every fibre of our resilience. Off the court, we pored over game strategies, ensuring that every player knew their role. Every pass, every pivot,

every leap into the air had to be second nature. By the time Regionals arrived in February, we were no longer a team in formation—we were a force to be reckoned with.
